Somerset Success



The Venue


A new year and a new start for the Jack Daley and Otto Scott Memorial Competition. The weather talk was all about doom and gloom for both days of competition. The wind was expected to reach thirty knots and the by Friday the heavens were going to open up with an almighty downpour.

Our weather forecasters were sort of right. There was a slight breeze and there were a couple of drops of water on the windscreen but that was about it. Even though the predictions were not the best, everyone was looking froward to another great trip to Somerset.

The Fishing



If you want to catch Bass, then you really need to catch some freshwater shrimp first. These tiny crustaceans are a deadly bait for just about any fish in the dam and if you know where to find them you actually stand a chance of catching a fish.



Now that you have gathered your shrimp, you also need to be able to find the fish which may be a bit more difficult than first thought. Many of our members had been to Somerset Dam before so they knew all the spots, but somebody forgot to tell the fish that they were coming. Sure there were plenty of fish on the sounder, but they definitely were not in feeding mode.

Individual fish and schools of baitfish were clearly visible but they were not interested in anything that was slowly sinking towards the bottom. Fish that are actively feeding can be

seen moving up and down in search of food and are often seen as long trails varying in depth as shown in the above photo.

Well everyone knew what they were looking for, but only two boats managed to find them.

Tony and Greg had all the technology. A great looking Qintrex fitted with an Minn Kota electric motor that would keep them positioned over the fish. The other boat belonged to Frank and Tammy. A small but stable little Stacer with a very noisy anchor chain that would scare every fish for miles.

There were some other good-looking boats out there like Trevor and Keiths Stessl as well as John White's three metre plastic, but the other boats found it very hard to locate the fish. There are obviously millions of fish in the dam, so if you have the right type of bait and you happen to be in the right spot, you will most probably hook up on a fish.

The Competition

It was just five in the morning when Keith and Trevor launched their boat despite the competition starting at six sharp, but there is always a lot of work to be done before the fishing starts. Fifteen minutes after leaving the boat ramp, Keith and Trevor slowly and carefully drifted onto the first of their shrimp pots. They have to be careful because you can hit a submerged log at anytime. This is the type of country where the shrimp live. Dead trees or sticks, underwater obstacles and sharp rocks are just lying in wait for that unsuspecting propellor.

It can take quite some time to gather all the shrimp out of all your pots, so there is no time to waste. Finally, with forty or fifty shrimp in the bucket, the boys headed out to where they hope the fish are.

With just fifteen minutes left before the competition starts, our fishers slowly scanned the bottom for any sign of fish but no luck. They knew where the fish were last year and the year before, so with no time left, they cast their lines in the hope that there may be a stray fish searching for a tasty morsel.

Tony and Greg and Frank and Tammy knew where the fish were and they too headed out in the early dawn to gather their shrimp but wait, "where are all the shrimp?"

I am not sure which is more frustrating; having all the shrimp and not finding the fish or knowing where the fish are and not having any shrimp. There is also the other scenario where the others have no shrimp and don't know where the fish are. I am not sure where you would go from here, except for taking a swim in the beautiful cool water; in fact that is exactly what Steve and Therese did.

Frank and Tammy had about fifteen very small shrimp and carefully dropped their unweighted lines over the fish and sure enough, they were immediately rewarded with three Australian bass, but their luck soon dried up as the last shrimp hit the water.

Tony and Greg had a more active approach. They too had a very limited supply of shrimp but when they ran out, they decided to do a little bit of trolling with their favourite lures. This obviously worked because the esky was soon full of bass.

How time flies! Four o'clock had come and everyone had gathered at the weigh-in station. Lots of oooh's and aaah's as each fish was weighed in but the competition hadn't finished yet. Day two was only one sleep away.

It seemed a lot darker the next morning in fact Frank had a lot of trouble backing down the ramp because he couldn't see the boat ramp until Tony Maatouk provided some extra light. Tony joined Frank for day two as Tammy was scheduled for another knee operation.

With a heart full of hope and a new location for the shrimp, Frank and Tony set out over the glassy water to collect their bait, but there were only about ten shrimp to be found. Amazing how you can come down from a massive high to a exceptional low in such a short time.

As the disillusioned pair looked across the misty water, they could see a flash of white racing across the water. Could this be their saviours? Frank opened the throttle and set the course for an intercept. As they drew closer they could see Keith and Trevor heading over to their shrimp pots.

Keith must have seen the look of disappointment and kindly offered about thirty shrimp. This is what the club is all about. This was a competition and the competition was fierce, but by the same token, it is also about true sportsmanship. This was not the first time that Keith and Trevor had offered to help other members of the club to their own detriment.

I have to add that all the help and information has always been shared openly, to ensure that everyone has an equal chance of catching fish.

It was another beautiful but overcast and cool morning when Tony Maatouk caught his first Somerset bass. As soon as the shrimp neared the bottom, it was snapped up by another bass. At least fifteen bass came into the boat, but not all were big enough to upgrade to a heavier fish.

Tony and Greg seemed very quiet and stayed in the one spot for quite a long time, which seemed to indicate that they too were onto some good fish but when the shrimp ran out, it was back to trolling for them.

Allan Woodward had teamed up with John and Barbara Wicks and had been moving around a bit, but they did manage a couple of Eel-tailed catfish. It was good to see a few of the other members in their boats. Peter and Sue certainly spent a bit of time on the water, although Peter needed to seek a little bit of medical attention for a few scrapes and bruises. Not sure what that was all about but it was good to see that the doctor gave him a clean bill of health. Steve and Therese enjoyed their swims and John White managed to get his boat wet a few times.

The Dinner

The club normally pays for the presentation dinner which is held at the camp kitchen. The kitchen is

well equipped with a large fridge, Boiling water, a couple of sinks and about six electric BBQs. Plenty of table and chairs and lighting that automatically turns on at about 6:15pm. Once again Julie Kable organised the rations with help from Robin Bourke and Vera Sipovac. The girls quietly slipped away and organised everything so that everything magically appears for the evening meal. Everyone enjoyed their hamburgers, sausages and lovely salads expertly cooked by Allan Woodward.


